#### husker day with fnbo

In March 2024, Husker fans of all ages flocked to the Lincoln Children's Museum for an unforgettable Husker Fan Day, presented by FNBO. The event was a flurry with excitement, featuring special appearances by Husker kicker Tristan Alvano, the beloved mascot, Herbie Husker, and members of the Husker Cheer Team.

Families had the chance to meet and take photos with Herbie, capturing memorable moments of Husker pride. Tristan Alvano delighted fans by signing autographs, creating a unique opportunity for young sports enthusiasts to connect with a Husker athlete. Children also got in on the action by practicing their football skills, kicking field goals, cheering each other on, and interacting with the FNBO fan photobooth exhibit.

This fan-tastic event exemplified the Museum's mission to create engaging, community-centered experiences, bringing families together for a day filled with fun, sportsmanship, and Husker pride.

Speaking of Huskers, we held Game Day Play Dates during each home football game. Kids enjoyed a tailgate at the Museum, while their parents went to the game.

#### nebraska's FIRST three-story luckey climber

In 2024, the Lincoln Children's Museum opened two new unique exhibits. The first exhibit, the Luckey Climber, debuted in August and created a jaw dropping focal point for visitors of all ages. The Luckey Climber is a one-of-a-kind, three-story climbing structure that captivates the imaginations of children and adults alike. As the first one ever installed in the state, this towering, plantlike structure invites children to climb, explore, and play like never before.

> The Luckey Climber is a part of the museum's "Here We Grow" exhibit and features a unique design reminiscent of a tall plant with "leaves" shaped like Pringles.

These curved, colorful platforms encourage children to ascend through the structure, all within the safety of protective netting that spans the Museum's three stories.

Tara Knuth, Chief Executive Officer of the Lincoln Children's Museum, shared her excitement about this groundbreaking addition:

> "We are incredibly proud to bring Nebraska its very first Luckey Climber. This exhibit is not just a climbing structure; it's an experience that fosters creativity, physical activity, and a sense of adventure in every child who visits. We love to see the joy it brings to families as they explore the Luckey Climber together."

This new centerpiece of the Lincoln Children's Museum offers a dynamic, interactive play experience that has become a fan favorite and is the perfect complement to the already popular "Cuckoo Construction Clock Tower."

### instruments on deck ring out downtown

The second new exhibit to open at the Lincoln Children's Museum in 2024 was the rhythmic, "Instruments on Deck." Partnering with the world's leading outdoor musical instrument manufacturer Percussion Play, the all-season outdoor play structures provide children and adults alike the opportunity to literally beat to their own drum with playful interactive percussion pieces.

"Instruments On Deck" is permanently located outside on the Museum's upper deck, where kids' musical creations can chime through the air. Percussion pieces represented in the exhibit include Tropical Cyclone, Bongos, Penta Post, Cavatina, Chimes, Sansa-Rimba, and Metallophone.

"Instruments On Deck" is open year-round and has seen constant engagement from visitors, regardless of rain, shine or even snow! This dynamic, interactive musical experience has become a favorite for children and families alike.

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## celebrating agriculture at the museum

On March 21, 2024, the Lincoln Children's Museum, in partnership with the Nebraska Farm Bureau Foundation, hosted a special event to celebrate National Agriculture Day. This free evening welcomed families to explore the museum's exhibits and engage in activities led by real Nebraska farmers.

The highlight of the evening was the museum's newly opened exhibit, "Here We Grow," which offers a wide range of entertaining and educational activities for children to explore the world of agriculture.

Children had the opportunity to learn about farming and ranching through interactive displays, fostering a deeper understanding of where their food comes from. #### small contributions, big impact in 2024

In 2024, Lincoln Children's Museum showcased how collective small donations can bring significant change. A heartwarming example is "The Magna-Tile Lady," who asked her friends to donate new Magna-Tiles or provide monetary donations for her birthday, resulting in numerous sets for day camps and after-school programs and a rotating exhibit of oversized tiles. Additionally, a gift of model airplanes and a monetary donation enhanced the aviation exhibit, sparking curiosity among young visitors. These stories illustrate how every gift, no matter the amount, can create meaningful experiences for museum guests.



#### community partnerships: supporting the museum

The Lincoln Children's Museum participated in Give to Lincoln Day, receiving \$13,590.14 to support the Museums for All initiative. The Museum also partnered with U-STOP and Zen Coffee Co. for kickback programs, raising additional funds and awareness. U-STOP's November gas purchase initiative raised \$7,067.79, while Zen Coffee's Gingerbread Latte sales in December contributed additional funds and promoted the Museum's annual fundraiser Candy House Kits. These efforts highlight the power of community collaboration, with contributions supporting the Museum's exhibits and programs.

# make time for play with **fake snow**

2 1/2 c of baking soda 1/2 c of white hair conditioner

stir ingredients in a large bowl until well combined



- Use your senses! The snow has an interesting texture and pleasant smell and can be cool to the touch. Ask your kiddo what they are feeling, smelling and seeing.
- Exercise fine motor skills with utensils to scoop the snow and your hands to make small snowballs for a snowman.

#### Other ways to use fake snow:

Create a habitat with tall "hills" and flat "land" for small play animal figures – add a few drops of food coloring during the mixing process to make your kiddo's favorite colors.
